A major part is covered before the mid-semester tests and the remaining thereafter. The progress is monitored in a meeting of the Academic Council where the Heads of Department assess the quantum of course curriculum covered. The mid semester test for all the classes are a mechanism that ensures that curriculum delivery has been done. The results compiled are conveyed to the parents and for Students. The Department of Computer Science provides the Machine Exercises to the students one week prior, so that the Lab Assistant as well as the practical teacher knows well in advance the work to be carried out. These exercises are electronically

documented and made available through the cloud. Also, class tests are being taken on regular basis and its record is maintained by the department, Moreover, video lectures on various topics have been uploaded on the cloud for helping the students at their convenience. University Question papers of the previous years are also available online through cloud.
